Thinking of the End at the Beginning: An Integrated Approach to Defense Investigation

Susan Randall, Owner/Investigator and Mitigation Specialist, VTPrivateye, LLC, Burlington, VT

An overview of the general timeline of investigating a criminal case, and explore how we as investigators, can prepare for whatever twists and turns a case will take, from the moment the case comes in. The presenter will discuss how to concurrently conduct a fact investigation and investigate the mitigating factors that make our client's story unique, regardless of budget. We can often work with a client's family to uncover facts in our clients' histories that change the narrative and make a huge difference in negotiations and at sentencing. Rather than waiting to prepare for a sentencing at the very end of a case, the presenter will discuss how we can combine a mitigation investigation with a thorough fact investigation, right from the get go. The presenter will share examples from 23 years of past cases she has worked on, where the defense was able to 'front end load' mitigation and use critical information about a client's history and unique circumstances in negotiations with the prosecutor. The presenter will discuss how we can sometimes effectively influence how a case is charged and greatly impact the ultimate outcome.

## KEYNOTE

### "The Mailbox Conspiracy"

Alexander Silvert, Retired First Assistant Federal Defender / Author, Honolulu, HI Adam Choka, Investigator, Office of the Federal Public Defender - District of Oregon, Eugene, OR

In 2013, the Chief of the Honolulu Police Department, Louis Kealoha, and his wife Katherine, the city's third-highest ranking prosecutor, accused a relative of stealing their mailbox. Approximately six years later, this law enforcement power couple and several other police officers were convicted of framing the relative and are currently serving federal prison sentences. The presentation will focus on how First Assistant FPD Alexander Silvert and his team of investigators at the Hawaii Federal Defenders Office, including Adam Choka, one of the FPD investigators in the case, uncovered evidence of their client's innocence, persuaded federal prosecutors to dismiss the case against their client and convinced the FBI to investigate the Kealohas. Silvert and Choka will tell the inside story of how defense investigation led to the exoneration of their client and helped uncover the biggest law enforcement corruption scandal in Hawaii history.
